Art, Science, and Medicine, 1600-1800

Until about 1800, "science" included not only the fields we expect, such as biology, chemistry, and what is now called physics, but also medicine (and even technology). While it may be hard for us in the twenty-first century to think in this way, for people living in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, it was normal. Illustrations, paintings, and even simple line drawings had the power to communicate science to a large audience. Literacy rates varied wildly during the period, but images, except for technical drawings, brought science to the masses.

This course examines the intersection of art and science during the early modern period. Topics include print culture, the production of "archetypal" images (especially botanical pieces), the circulation of knowledge both within the scientific community and to a wider audience, and ideas of the Enlightenment.

There will be one or two optional museum visits for students. Details at the start of the course.

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Canvas & Zoom

Thank you for registering for this online course! You will only need a computer with internet connection to participate, as well as a means of photographing your artwork to upload -- a cell phone camera will suffice. PAFA utilizes Canvas as their online learning platform and Zoom for video conferencing. Canvas allows you to view course content (video, images, text), upload homework assignments for instructor feedback, and communicate both with the instructor one-on-one and with other students via message boards. The course content is typically uploaded each Monday and you will have 24-hour access to all posted content to pursue according to your own schedule.
